Delta Fiber LLC (“Delta Fiber”) is pleased to announce that it was a winning bidder for \$46.9 million dollars of grant support over ten years from the Federal Communications Commission (“FCC”) to expand its gigabit, fiber to the premise, high-speed internet network to certain FCC designated rural areas within the service territory of its parent company, Delta Electric Power Association (“Delta Electric”). Delta Fiber is a wholly-owned subsidiary of Delta Electric and operates an existing internet service provider under the name, DE LightSpeed. Under the terms of this pending FCC award, Delta Fiber will expand its existing internet service over a six year period to FCC designated unserved or underserved rural areas of Bolivar, Carroll, Grenada, Holmes, Leflore, Montgomery, Sunflower, Tallahatchie, and Washington Counties. This broadband expansion project is designed to pass 10,465 FCC designated locations that have less than 25/3 (25 Mbps download/3 Mbps upload) internet service or no internet service at all.

Delta Fiber participated in the FCC’s Rural Digital Opportunity Fund Auction (“RDOF Auction”) as a member of the Rural Electric Cooperative Consortium, which was put together by Delta Fiber’s national partner, Conexon. The RDOF Auction concluded on November 25, 2020 with 180

winning bidders and FCC nationwide broadband support won totaling \$9.2 billion over ten years. Mississippi's winning RDOF Auction bidders garnered the second highest amount of state support at \$495 million behind California at \$695 million. The Rural Electric Cooperative Consortium won \$1.1 Billion of nationwide FCC support in 22 states and \$220.6 million of FCC support in Mississippi alone. Delta Fiber won the highest support of any Mississippi RDOF Auction bidder. **Under FCC communication rules, Delta Fiber was prohibited from publicly disclosing its RDOF Auction results until now.** See the FCC press release below for more information on the RDOF Auction.

David O'Bryan, CEO of Delta Fiber said, "We are very happy with the results of the RDOF auction. This is the culmination of several years of hard work to bring fiber to the premise, gigabit speed internet service to our Delta Electric customers. This is a once in a lifetime opportunity that will greatly enhance the quality of life for customers of Delta Electric in this project area. I sense the same level of excitement with this broadband deployment as our ancestors did when Delta Electric first brought electricity to these identical rural areas in the late 1930's. We want to thank our national partner, Conexon, for their auction support along with the FCC and former FCC Chairman Ajit Pai for making these funds available to electric cooperatives for broadband expansion in our rural areas."

Delta Electric previously received \$4.9 million dollars in matching grants for a pilot broadband project under the Mississippi Electric Cooperatives COVID-19 Grant Program from \$1.2 billion of CARES Act federal stimulus funds allocated to Mississippi. Since before Thanksgiving of last year, some Delta Electric customers in the designated pilot project areas have been receiving high speed internet service from DE LightSpeed and the feedback has been "absolutely outstanding", according to O'Bryan. "Our existing internet customers are getting a world class, ultra-fast, fiber internet service at symmetrical speeds meaning that the download and upload speeds are the same. We look forward to providing this same level of service in the designated unserved and underserved areas covered by this FCC support," he said.

DE LightSpeed is offering residential and business internet packages with minimum speeds of 100 Mbps and maximum speeds of 1000 Mbps or Gigabit speed service. “We chose fiber optics as our internet delivery technology because it is the gold standard for delivering the maximum bandwidth and throughput of any technology available with little or no buffering and it is scalable. Fiber optics allows for the transmission of information at the speed of light,” said O’Bryan. “Our Delta Electric residential customers will have the very best communication network available through DE LightSpeed for working from home, telemedicine, education from home, shopping, entertainment, video streaming services and video conferencing. DE LightSpeed internet customers get unlimited data and a free mobile app to manage their Wi-fi experience,” he said.

“We are very aware of the urgent need for high speed internet in our rural areas due to COVID-19 and our highest priority is getting the internet service out to our Delta Electric customers in these designated rural areas as soon as possible,” said O’Bryan. “This expansion will take place over several years so we ask for time and patience as we work to bring high speed internet service to these FCC specified unserved and underserved areas in Delta Electric’s service territory. More information on the expansion will be made available in the near future to Delta Electric customers on the DE LightSpeed website,” he said.

BROADBAND TO OVER 10 MILLION RURAL AMERICANS*****Phase I Auction Allocates \$9.2 Billion to Close the Digital Divide in 49 States  
and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands***

WASHINGTON, December 7, 2020—The Federal Communications Commission announced today that millions of rural Americans in 49 states and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands will gain access to high-speed Internet service through the Rural Digital Opportunity Fund Phase I auction. Auction results released today show that bidders won funding to deploy high-speed broadband to over 5.2 million unserved homes and businesses, almost 99% of the locations available in the auction. Moreover, 99.7% of these locations will be receiving broadband with speeds of at least 100/20 Mbps, with an overwhelming majority (over 85%) getting gigabit-speed broadband. CCO Holdings, LLC (Charter Communications) was assigned the most locations, just over 1.05 million. A total of 180 bidders won auction support, to be distributed over the next 10 years.

A broad range of providers successfully competed in the Phase I auction, including cable operators, electric cooperatives, incumbent telephone companies, satellite companies, and fixed wireless providers. And the FCC’s structuring of the reverse auction yielded significant savings, as competitive bidding among over 300 providers yielded an allocation of \$9.2 billion in support out of the \$16 billion set aside for Phase I of the auction. Importantly, the \$6.8 billion in potential Phase I support that was not allocated will be rolled over into the future Phase II auction, which now can draw upon a budget of up to \$11.2 billion in targeting partially-served areas (and the few unserved areas that did not receive funding through Phase I).

“I’m thrilled with the incredible success of this auction, which brings welcome news to millions of unconnected rural Americans who for too long have been on the wrong side of the digital divide. They now stand to gain access to high-speed, high-quality broadband service,” said FCC Chairman Ajit Pai. “We structured this innovative and groundbreaking auction to be technologically neutral and to prioritize bids for high-speed, low-latency offerings. We aimed for maximum leverage of taxpayer dollars and for networks that would meet consumers’ increasing broadband needs, and the results show that our strategy worked. This auction was the single largest step ever taken to bridge the digital divide and is another key success for the

Commission in its ongoing commitment to universal service. I thank our staff for working so hard and so long to get this auction done on time, particularly during the pandemic.”

The auction used a multi-round, descending clock auction format in which bidders indicated in each round whether they would commit to provide service to an area at a given performance tier and latency at the current round’s support amount. The auction was technologically neutral and open to new providers, and bidding procedures prioritized bids for higher speeds and lower latency.

The auction unleashed robust price competition that resulted in more locations being awarded at less cost to Americans who pay into the Universal Service Fund. The 5,220,833 locations assigned support in the auction had an initial reserve price of over \$26 billion over the next decade; through vigorous competition among bidders, the final price tag to cover these locations is now just over \$9 billion, with the vast majority of locations receiving gigabit broadband—far above the 25/3 Mbps minimum level of service that providers could bid on in the auction.

Providers must meet periodic buildout requirements that will require them to reach all assigned locations by the end of the sixth year. They are incentivized to build out to all locations as fast as possible.

The Rural Digital Opportunity Fund Phase I auction is part of a broader effort by the FCC to close the digital divide in rural America and focus limited universal service funds on unserved areas that most need support. In October 2020, the Commission adopted rules creating the 5G Fund for Rural America, which will distribute up to \$9 billion over the next decade to bring 5G wireless broadband connectivity to unserved areas in rural America.
